BEYOND SAFETY GLASSES

WHAT HAPPENED:

- Roustabout was scrapping/chipping on a BOP unit when a foreign body flew into his eye. He was wearing safety glasses.
- Employee was mixing chemicals with the wind blowing hard and some chemicals blew into his eye. He was wearing safety glasses.
- Floorman was cleaning derrick with rig wash. Some soapy water (chemicals) ran down his forehead into his left eye. He was wearing safety glasses.
- Roustabout was hosing off the shaker screens and mud (chemicals) splashed under his safety glasses into his eye.
- During the first week of a rig construction project, there were 7 eye injuries. The work environment was such that a large amount of particulates were in the air. The injured were all wearing safety glasses.

WHAT CAUSED IT:

Everyone mentioned above was wearing their safety glasses, **yet they were not wearing the proper PPE.** Safety glasses were required on the company's drilling locations. However, when chemicals are involved, a lot of particulate or dust, a wash down situation, chipping, etc., then safety glasses may not be enough protection.

CORRECTIVE ACTIONS: To address these incidents, this company did the following:

- Supervisors were instructed to analyze activities that may require <u>additional eye protection</u> and "talk with their people" to ensure that employees understand that safety glasses alone are not always adequate eye protection.
- The company recommended that goggles be worn if there is exposure to high wind conditions, particulate (chipping/scraping operations), chemicals (including rig wash, detergent, mixing or painting), air discharge, water under pressure (water hoses or wash down guns), to name a few.
- Rig supervisors were required to check to ensure that they had an adequate supply of goggles and face shields to meet the needs.
- The company recommended that **both** a face shield **and** goggles be used when using a grinder or while mixing mud (chemicals).
- Face shields and goggles in good condition were placed at all workstations such as bench grinders, portable grinders and mud (Chemical) mixing hoppers.
- Supervisors and employees were instructed to ensure that eye protection is kept clean and in good condition.
