NEAR MISS – MATERIAL DROPPED FROM OVERHEAD LOAD

WHAT HAPPENED:

In a recent incident a serious near miss occurred while the Crane Operator and the Roustabout crew were offloading 4-1/2" tubing from a boat. Plastic type separators were used to separate the layers of tubing. A piece of plastic separator from the load fell approximately 50' and struck a service company employee. The service company employee was not seriously injured.

WHAT CAUSED IT:

- The slings were wrapped too close to the separators, causing damage.
- The straps holding the separators to the tubing were broken and allowed the broken piece to fall.
- The Crane Operator did not warn employees of an impending lift and employees remained under the load even after the lift had commenced.

CORRECTIVE ACTIONS: To address this incident, this company did the following:

- Re-enforcement of rigger training may be necessary for Roustabouts as well as shore base personnel who load the boats.
- Stress to all employees and other personnel on the rig that they must always be aware of overhead loads.
- Crane Operators were instructed not to maneuver a suspended load over the heads of personnel and sound a warning for everyone to stand clear if such a swing is made.
- Crane Operators were instructed to keep unnecessary personnel outside of the crane's area of operation.
- Standing under a suspended load is a violation of Company Safety Policy, and will be enforced.
- Pre-tour and pre-job meetings should detail when loads are planned and the specific areas that will be affected.
- Staying clear of loads is the last line of defense to avoid incidents with overhead loads. This must be emphasized with visitors and crews whenever lifts are planned.
